The Paris Commune is often said to be the first example of working people taking power. For this reason it is a highly significant event, even though it is ignored in the French history curriculum. On March 18 1871, after France was defeated by Prussia in the Franco-Prussian war, the French government sent troops into Paris to try and take back the Parisian National Guard ' s cannon before the people got hold of it.

1871: The Paris Commune

April 11: In an attack on southern Paris the French army is repulsed with heavy losses by General Eudes. April 12: The Commune decides that the Victory Column on the Place Vend ô me, which had been cast from guns captured by Napoleon after the war of 1809, should be demolished as a symbol of chauvinism and incitement to national hatred. This decree was carried out on May 16.
